
Let's build an "eternal terrarium"!

What you need:



And off we go!

1. take your empty and Clean jar

2. fill it with about 2 fingers width of gravel


3. pour about 3 fingers width of soil on the gravel

4. place the mosses and plant trimmings as you like

5. let your rubber animal move in

6. add a little bit of water

7. Close your jar tight







And how does it work now?

Your jar contains a complete, small ecosystem.

Place your jar on the windowsill. This way your plants will get enough sunlight to grow. Just make sure your jar doesn't sit in direct sunlight.

As the water in the jar evaporates, moisture will form on the glass and turn into "rainfall". This should change back and forth during the day. If your jar is always steamy, then you should open it for a short time to air it out. If the glass doesn't steam up at all, then just add a few drops of water.

Your plants produce oxygen with photosynthesis. You will quickly see how well they grow!

Keep your jar closed! Once you've reached the perfect balance, you can enjoy your terrarium for a very long time!
